St. John's Pine Meadow Annual Meeting January 30, 2022

On-site and via Zoom Called of order at 10:00 am following the 9:00 am service

Reading of the Notice of the Annual Parish Meeting: Motion to waive the reading of the notice of the annual parish meeting by Blake Hall, seconded by Susie Horn. All in favor.

Reading of the Roll of Voting Members: Clerk, Beth Coates, motioned to dispense in the reading of the Roll of Voting member. Seconded by Ginny Hoffmann. All in favor.

Minutes of the 2021 Annual Meeting Minutes: Moved to approve 2021 meeting minutes by Beth Coates, seconded by Nancy Butler. All in favor.

Reception of Reports Submitted in Writing: Motion to accept reports by John Gargiulo, seconded by Guy Hayes. All in favor as presented.

Financial Reports 2021 Year End and 2022 Budget:

Diane Hayes, Assistant Treasurer, gave an overview of the 2022 Stewardship report:

• 119 pledge requests mailed; 65 pledges returned. Approx. same number of pledges as last year, however, 7 returning pledges that had lapsed and 1 brand new pledge received. In addition, the dollar amount of pledges increased by \$14,449 over 2021 as of the last report, with a total of \$157,900. Note: additional pledge money has been received since reporting. Will make adjustments after February Vestry meeting.

Larry Espinet, Treasurer, gave overview of 2021 End of Year and 2022 Budget:

- **2021** financials resulted in a balanced budget totaling \$204,835.
 - o Revenue trailed the budget by \$3,192, however expenses trailed the budget by \$10,727.
 - o Reserves held at the local bank and endowments increased substantially.
 - o Please see treasurer report for specific details.

2022 Budget

- The 2022 budget is very close to balanced budget (0.2% deficit).
- Keeping the budget balanced will require usage of unused endowment from reserves from 2019,2020, 2021 (\$34,944) as well as fundraising income from scrip (\$3000) and the concerts (\$3000).
- o Unused Endowment Reserves are helping to make up shortfall of no PPE loan in 2022.
- o Projected revenue budgeted at \$218,806 (6.8% increase over 2021 actuals), projected expenses budgeted at \$219,329 (7.1% increase over 2021 actuals)
- o -Full details are in submitted Financial Reports.
- o It was noted that finalized numbers will be made after the February vestry meeting to account for additional pledges.

Larry moved the financial reports, seconded by John Gargiulo. All in favor.

Mother Cosman notified the parish that we have received official notification that we are in good standing with the Diocese. Filed all reports, all required documents, and met our diocesan pledge.

Thank you for Vestry Service: Mother Cosman thanked Melanie Kirkpatrick David and Beth Coates for their work on the Vestry. As well as John Gargiulo for agreeing to an additional term. An abundance of thanks to those rotating off and those serving for their dedication and hard work.

It seems like most of this year happened after Mother Cosman left. Four people in our parish died. Aside from losing close friends, we had to figure out how to do the funerals. We were blessed to have Rev. Salin Low step in and take over. They were all beautiful ceremonies and the families and friends were pleased. Mother Evelyn stepped up for us again and performed a Baptism for four adopted boys.

We had to scramble to find supply priests. It was late in the season and everyone was booked through January. With the help of Bob Osborne, Mother Evelyn and Anne Hall, Michelle learned how to put together our morning prayer services. Gordon, Anne and I have been doing Morning Prayer. We tried to minimize morning prayers to twice a month. Anne Hall and Michael Hayes have been doing the homilies for these services. Mother Evelyn graciously agreed to fill in to do a Eucharistic service twice a month. There have been so many times that we had to say "lets run that by Bob or Anne or Mother Evelyn". Again I have to say we are a blessed parish to have such knowledgeable collection of people who are so willing to share their skills and time. Having had the experience with scheduling, has made it much easier the second half of the year to get the supply priests. We are pretty well scheduled through April. We have gotten lots of positive feedback on both of the Supply Priests we have had and both have been booked for return dates.

We have been working double time trying to keep our close knit St. John's family close knit. Bringing back coffee hour was an important first step. Cider and donuts in the garden and a pot luck brunch were two more activities. Creating an atmosphere where people wanted to reconnect and sit around and chat was the goal. We are a strong thriving parish even without a Priest. These activities take lots of work, and lots of parishioners volunteered. So much work goes into running a church, and the people of St. John's have taken on the challenge with flying colors. Volunteering to clean, vacuum, wipe down, polish, take out trash, run committees, be on committees, run cameras, run special services, attend a service, ring bells, set up and take down the alter, being part of the services, get and arrange flowers, take notes, write reports, work food drives, fill shelves in the Little Free Pantry, set up and take down and decorate for special events so that they feel like special events. They hand out programs and greet parishioners sincerely with a warm smile. Anyone walking into St. John's knows that this is a church that they want to belong to. As a parish we will continue to love God above all else and love our neighbor as ourselves. We will grow

into the parish God wants us to be and we will do it with a greater appreciation of who we are and what we are capable of doing.

St. John's has more planned for our future. We are working to up-date our web page. Making donations on line will be easy and convenient. There will be monthly meetings for our seniors starting January 24th, at 12:00 when various activities will be held. Bring your own lunch. Coffee will be provided, bring a friend. Bob Osborne is working on reinstating home Eucharistic visits. We are working on the transition process for our new priest and making progress. More special events are being planned. We are not a stagnant community. We will not sit back and wait for a PIC. We will take charge and move forward. We have accomplished a lot so far this year and we have only just begun.

Finally, after many false starts, we succeeded in fixing the amplification system in the main church. ST. JOHN'S LITTLE FREE PANTRY ANNUAL REPORT 2022

Little Free Pantry - Nobody ever dreamed that the LFP would grow and become so important to New Hartford and the surrounding communities when it all started. LFP now has a line in the budget. As well as food, people contribute money during our food drives. People have asked for donations be made to LFP instead of flowers for funerals. Organizations have made donations and we have gotten grants. When our shelves get bare, we are able to buy supplies. As our funds are growing, so are the needs of the people who depend on the LFP.

Every third Saturday of the month from 10:00-1:00 we have a food drive. This is advertised on the New Hartford web page and Christine at Town Hall sends a town wide e-mail. If our shelves are especially bare, she puts in an URGENT. That makes a huge difference. We also advertise on New Hartford, Bakerville, and West Hill Chats. People will also put out the word on their Facebook pages. The Bakerville School holds an annual food drive for the LFP. A fifth grade teacher chose to have her class donate food to the LFP instead of giving her a Christmas gift. We are so thankful for everyone's generosity.

The LFP could not exist without the donations of so many. It also could not exist without all the people who contribute their time and hard work. Stocking the shelves, and keeping the area organized neat and clean is a major accomplishment. Volunteers buy groceries when supplies get low and work through all kinds of weather during the food drives. I would like to give special thanks to Susie Horn and Donna Colavecchio who have spent many hours stocking shelves and to Anne Hall, Barbara Henri and Diane and Guy Hayes who have spent many hours at the food drives. As the need and our commitment grow, with your continued support, the LFP will also continue to grow.

REPORT OF THE TWO ECCT CONVENTION GATHERINGS DURING 2022

Special Election Convention – May 21

Convention delegates from throughout the ECCT were called on May 21 to the Connecticut Convention Center, and an auxiliary location at Christ Church Cathedral, to elect a new Bishop Diocesan to succeed Bishop Ian T. Douglas who was about to retire in October of 2022.

The Rev. Jeffrey Mello , rector of St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Brookline, Massachusetts, was elected as the 16th Bishop of the Episcopal Church in Connecticut. Father Mello was chosen on the sixth ballot out of a slate of five nominees. He received 129 votes of 225 cast in the lay order and 113 of 175 cast in the clergy order. An election on that ballot required 114 in the lay order and 89 in the clergy order.

The Rev. Whitney Altopp, rector, St. Stephens Episcopal Church, Ridgefield, Connecticut.

The ordination and consecration of Bishop Mello took place at the Connecticut Convention Center on October 24.

Annual Diocesan Convention – November 4 and 5

Once a year, parish and worship community leaders from the Episcopal Church in Connecticut gather together for prayer, listening, and to conduct the business of our diocese. On Friday and Saturday, November 4 and 5, clergy and lay delegates gathered at the Connecticut Convention Center in Hartford, or virtually on line, to carry out this annual meeting.

Business sessions were augmented by occasions of reflection and worship. One of the highlights was the first address to convention by our newly ordained and consecrated Diocesan Bishop, The Rt. Rev. Jeffrey Mello. In addition, delegates had opportunity to worship at a Taize Evensong at our newly renovated cathedral just a short walk from the Convention Center.

Later during the convention the topic of Racial Healing, Justice and Reconciliation Ministry was addressed and a Task force on Reparations provided a series of break-out sessions for delegates' discussion and possible recommendations.

Returning to the business of the convention, delegates approved a budget for 2023, elected or approved members of several diocesan boards and commissions, and considered several resolutions to further the life and ministry in the new normal of our life together.

One final note of special interest to our St. John's family was the election of one of our Wardens, Gordon Ross. to the position of Treasurer of ECCT. Gordon was presented to the convention and had opportunity to speak words of acceptance. Congratulations and best wishes are in order for Gordon on his election to this very important diocesan responsibility.
